The Carillion, Sherwood Park office gave a warm welcome to the team to allow continual business operation in the first couple of weeks of displacement. Thank you, Carillion! On May 24th, Melcor Development Ltd. graciously donated office space at their Jasper Avenue location until it is safe to return to Fort McMurray. Thank you, Melcor Development Ltd!

Bouchier will remain committed to our sustainability commitment of building strong communities. We look forward to assessing the upcoming requirements to get our community back to normal in the coming months.

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STORIES FROM THE EVACUATION

These messages from Rod Torres, Site Manager, Shell after a few emotional days of working through the Fort McMurray Evacuation from the May 3rd fire.

MAY 10, 2016

Yes, I am absolutely in great spirits still, considering. I am definitely exhausted, though. A lot of late nights, a lot of moving parts, so this break will be needed.

Day 1 of the evacuation north of the city, we were greeting people in the lobby, giving them rooms, as rooms became available. By approximately 12:00AM, we ran out of rooms to give out. We started spreading the word, and then one or two people began "volunteering" their personal room, to allow a family to take it with their kids. This was a really tough time for a few of us, as we then had the pressure of giving rooms to "needy" families as opposed to "not as needy". How do you differentiate that? How do you live with the guilt of helping one family over the other? At what point do we turn people away? I actually asked one of the camp managers this, he said "We were told we are turning people away, whatever it takes." This said a lot, it really did. This sent the message and set the pace for our Bouchier team.

I took the responsibility myself as I didn't want my guys to feel any guilt in giving out the "special volunteered rooms", and as I write this email, it actually brings back emotions from that day, and remembering some of the families I had to turn away. In all honesty, I consider myself fairly toughskinned, but nothing brings sadness out more than seeing displaced and/ or vulnerable parents looking for your help. What got us through this was

simple—help those that you can, feel good about your decision, and not look back. I remember a young family with a disabled son on an oxygen tank, blind, and in a wheelchair. I remember a young single-mother with tears in her eyes; she had lost her home, had no ID, and had three little kids likely under the age of eight. I remember a single father with two boys, both with severe allergies to dust, who had been napping on a table upstairs; they were just looking for blankets and/or a quiet place to go. It's these families that actually gave us joy in helping them, as they received their "golden ticket". I actually had about 20 room keys volunteered to us, to give to these types of families. Even one of our own Bouchier guys, Brian Dawe, gave up the first room key to me, and said simply, "Rod, here is my room key. I can't sleep in my room; it's not right. Give it to a good family". I had another guy who overheard my conversation, and he asked if he and four of his fellow co-workers from a contracting company could do the same; they would even clean up the room themselves. This just created a snowball effect, and our plan really came together. We went until about 3:00AM, until we ran out of rooms, ran out of cots, ran out of blankets and pillows. A day I will never forget.

On **Day 2**, we began marshalling people for flights—Fort McMurray residents, dogs, cats, lizards and other site people. We had about 21 flights this day and approximately 1,700 people to fly out. Insane day—again, very gratifying and humbling—but just a pleasure to hear the people thank us over and over for the great assistance and organization. At this time, people just needed the confidence that they were in a safe place, and were headed somewhere to set up a new place to call home. Just over-the-top friendly and gracious people. Sure, there were some that were more concerned than others, that were desperate to leave; even for those people, we were able to make adjustments to get on an earlier flight, as again, people volunteered their spots.

Also, who knew we had so many great dishwashers on staff! The Village kitchen was so under-staffed with the extra people taken in, we had at least six people helping non-stop, washing dishes into the late night. They really experienced great team-work, and not once did I hear complaints for the duties they performed.

Day 3, was a little more of the same, and there seemed to be more light on the horizon. In the end, my personal goal was to keep the team in highest spirits, help where we could, and stay as tight as ever.

Shell was a HUGE help in allowing us to help all of these people; allowing us to break out of our daily schedule to do whatever it would take to help each and every family. I just wanted to get this summary out, as I know a lot of you were probably wondering what transpired. Sorry for the long-winded email, but quite a bit happened in a short period of time.

I wish all the best to those who lost their homes. I know the memories are impossible to get back, but there is a big family within the company and the city that will help everyone get through it.

Message from Rod Torres (cont.)

MAY 18, 2016

I have a really great story of a Bouchier evacuee from Fort McMurray. He just came back on shift eight days late, as he was evacuated and had to tend to his family first, and now needed to get back to work as most have for financial reasons. I had the opportunity to sit with him at dinner tonight and finally catch up, as he just flew in from Edmonton where he has presently moved his family.

Kevin Giroux is a Labourer at Shell Albian for me, and we actually chose him as our **April Employee of the Month** due to his great attitude, exceptional safe work ethic and attitude. He is of Aboriginal descent, and with his wife and two kids (2 years and 4 years old), has a rental home in Fort McMurray.

On the night of May 2, Kevin was working his second job as an operator with Wood Buffalo Municipality, as he does on his days off. He got called in to help build the fireguard behind the Abasand area, where he lived, and after a successful night, was sent home after his shift.

By the morning of May 3, the very same fireguard that he was part of building did not fully stand, and he was forced to evacuate. His neighbour, in the townhome beside him, did not own a vehicle and also had their own children. Kevin gave the keys to his truck, and told them to take the truck and get their kids to safety. He then packed up his other truck and took his own family away from his home, as at this point, they didn't have much time to leave. As he and the neighbour both pulled away, he looked back 50 metres and could see his home fully engulfed in flames.

He and his family travelled to a First Nations community in Anzac. They were evacuated again from there the following day. At this point, they continued to drive south and finally arrived in Edmonton, at their friend's place. This is where they currently reside.

Kevin had just taken the insurance off his rental home as they were moving out to a newer townhome. So unfortunately, not only did he lose his home, but has no insurance, and lost all their belongings, all the kids' toys, etc. Kevin has no idea that I am telling you his story. I just wondered if there is anything Bouchier is able to do to assist even with the kids' things or any fundraising that can be done. He has asked me for nothing. I had sat down with him to be assured he was okay, and wanted to know how things were as I knew he had lost his home. At this point, he just wants to work and move on.

Just a really good happy, great attitude guy, with an unfortunate situation.

To Whom It May Concern:

Our family resides in Fort McMurray, and have our businesses in Fort McMurray.

We were under mandatory evacuation on Tuesday, May 3rd and since the highway south was closed, were directed north to Shell. Eventually, we drove into Shell Albian.

I am wheelchair-bound, having suffered a stroke last year and am only recently out of the hospital. My son is handicapped also, so my husband and daughter had their hands full hauling us and our assorted belongings. Because I had very quickly run out of medication, the next day we were taken to the airport to fly out to Edmonton.

In particular, **Jeremy Merrithew** of Bouchier (with the help of another kind man, **Felix Naji**) was incredibly kind and helpful, carrying for me and hauling me around, waiting with me and then carrying me up the steps onto the plane.

As you can imagine the whole situation with fire, our business, our homes, etc. has been stressful, but our family remembers the experience as an uplifting one because of our experiences with the personnel at Albian.

Thank you for your people. Again, thank you, and bless you!
